On Wednesday 24 October the Vale of Clwyd Singers will give a recital in the chapel at 2pm entitled *Tippett Spirituals from A Child of Our Time*. An afternoon of romantic a cappella works.

The group was formed in 2012 by a group of experienced and professional performers in the Vale of Clwyd and the North West. They started as a quintet singing carols and collecting money for local charities.

Knowing that the competition with the immensely popular Male voice Choir tradition in North Wales was a battle not worth fighting, they decided to expand into an *a cappella* (unaccompanied voices) group specialising in Italian and English madrigals, folk songs, rounds and cannons, and more recently, scat, swing and jazz.

Recent concerts included a celebration of the Centenary of Liverpool's Alder Hey Childrens' Hospital held in Liverpool's famous Anglican Cathedral. They have been invited to appear at music festivals at Conwy and Malpas, and at the North Wales International Music Festival at St Asaph Cathedral.

The group comes to the chapel at the suggestion of Sir Mark Hudson, KCVO, Chairman of the Council of the Duchy of Lancaster.

Wales is known as a land of song; we look forward to hearing them sing.

Harvest Festival

On Sunday 15 October we welcome the trustees and supporters of the Addington Fund to mark Harvest Festival. The Fund is a charity that specifically directed towards helping the farming community. The Fund provides homes for farming families living in England and Wales who have to leave the industry and by doing so will lose their home and also offers emergency grants in times of hardship. The Fund was set up as the Churches' response to Foot and Mouth Disease when it distributed grants totalling £10.3 million to over 22,000 applicants. Today, the Fund continues to support viable farming families experiencing financial hardship due to circumstances affecting the business which are completely out of their control. The rural idyll is captivating, and easily persuades us to think that the countryside is a wonderful place in which to live and work. It conceals the very real extent of rural poverty and the high rate of depression and suicide which afflicts the farming community. The collection on this Sunday will be given to the Addington Fund. The sermon will be given by The Right Reverend John Flack, Bishop of Huntingdon (1997-2003) and Director of the Anglican Centre in Rome (2003-08).
