On Sunday 4 February, the sermon will be given by The Reverend Lady (Denise) Brown. Sir David Brown was chairman of Motorola Ltd 1997-2008 and President of the Institution of Electrical Engineers 2003-04.

The Valentine Service for couples who have been married at the Chapel, or who have had their marriages blessed at the Chapel is on Tuesday 13 February at 6pm. The first Valentine Service was held on 14 February 1975 (it was then called the 'Marriage Re-Union Service') and has been held in February every year since that date.

The penitential season of Lent begins on Wednesday 14 February (Ash Wednesday). There will be a service of Holy Communion at 12.30pm. The season commemorates the time spent by Christ in the wilderness. The accompanying picture, entitled 'Christ in the Desert' was painted in 1872 by the Russian artist Ivan Kramskoi (1837-87). As one observer noted: 'The entire figure seems to have diminished a bit from its natural size, contracted, not from starvation, thirst and bad weather, but from internal, inhuman insight to his thought and will during the struggle of forces of spirit and flesh.' It conveys something of the

endurance of Christ in those 'forty days and forty nights.'



COLLECTIONS

The back page of this monthly programme gives a list of the charitable donations made from the chapel collections. Because the structure and fabric of the chapel are cared for by the Duchy of Lancaster, we do not face the difficulties of many of parish churches, where the heavy burden of maintaining a sometimes historic and beautiful building falls mostly on the limited resources of sometimes small congregations. The policy agreed by the chapel council is to give away 50% of our collections to charitable causes. As you will see from the list, our donations have gone towards charities especially connected with the relief of poverty, sickness and homelessness.
