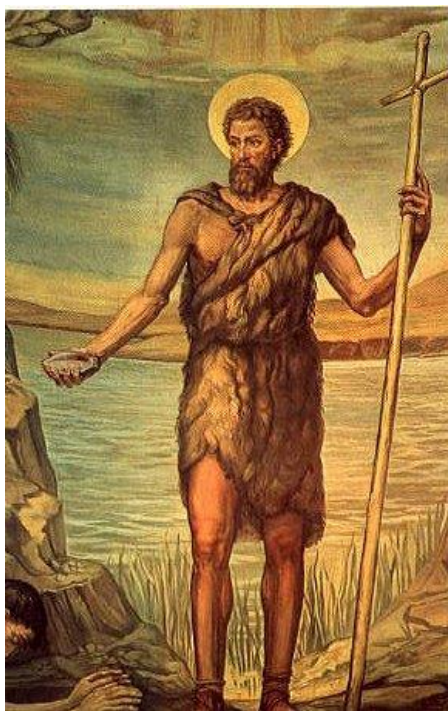


The Eucharist will be followed by a barbecue in the chapel garden. The number of places is limited to 120. If you would like to attend, please notify the Steward.

Sunday 10 June

This year marks the centenary of the Representation of the People Act 1918, the legislation which extended to women the right to vote. The act was passed in response to the vigorous efforts of the suffragette movement and the role of women in the First World War.

Suffragettes were often greeted with hostility and violence. It is pleasing to know that one of their earliest and strongest supporters was The Reverend Hugh Boswell Chapman, Chaplain of the Savoy (1908-1933). He is commemorated by the stained glass window above the entrance doorway. Chapman was remembered by Sylvia Pankhurst: 'There were some generous souls, the Reverend Hugh Chapman of the Royal Chapel of the Savoy and others, who raised their voices in protest, in appeal to the authorities to withdraw their obstinate opposition to the cause for which the women fought' (Sylvia Pankhurst, *The Suffragette: The History of the Women's Militant Suffrage Movement*, page 396).

The service on 10 June will celebrate the 1918 act by the choir singing compositions by Eve Barsham and Judith Weir, and by Dame Ethel Smythe's rousing song *The March of the*

Women, which became the anthem of the Women's Social and Political Union,

Sunday 24 June

On this Sunday the Chapel celebrates its patronal festival by keeping the feast of the Birth of Saint John the Baptist. The chapel is all that remains of a hospital founded by the will of King Henry VII, to be called the 'Hospital of Henry late King of England of the Savoy.' The hospital was dedicated in the name of Saint John the Baptist, the great forerunner of Christ. His message was delivered in the powerful oratory of an Old Testament prophet, and he represents a bridge between the Old and New Testaments.

John is mentioned in all four canonical gospels, as well as the non-canonical Gospel of the Nazarenes, and is also revered as a major religious figure in Islam and the Baha'i faith.

The preacher will be The Reverend John Witheridge, Chaplain to The Queen, and formerly Conduct of Eton (1987-96) and Headmaster of Charterhouse (1986-2014).
